Welcome to Strathcarron Hospice Education Centre Autumn 2009 programme of study days and shorts courses. The centre aims to enable health and social care practitioners to provide high quality palliative care to all those in need through a high standard of education, commitment and support to life long learning related to Palliative Care. Strathcarron Hospice Education Centre has one full time and three part time lecturers and an education administrator. Each lecturer has had a varied background in palliative care before moving into education. In addition to experienced education lecturers, courses regularly include input from members of the clinical team at Strathcarron Hospice as well as external speakers with a wide range of expertise.

In addition to our programme we are able to work with a diverse range of groups and organisations that may require palliative care education/training. We welcome specific requests for tailor made study days or courses and to develop and deliver them in relation the needs of the specific group or organisation.

DR ERNA HARALDSDOTTIR – HEAD OF DEPARTMENT

Having trained as a nurse in Iceland in the 1980s, the major part of Erna's nursing career has been in palliative care in community and hospital settings. She has wide experience of teaching health care practitioners in palliative care issues. Erna was instrumental in setting up the first palliative care team at the Icelandic National Hospital and helped to establish the first in-patient hospice in Iceland. She has a Master's degree in nursing from the University of Edinburgh and has just completed her PhD, how the phenomenon of "being with" appears in palliative care nurses' day to day practice at a hospice in Scotland. Her current main interests are in reflective clinical practice, clinical supervision and spiritual issues in palliative care.

Elaine joined the team in 1997 following a Master's Degree in nursing at Glasgow University and experience in under-graduate and continuing nurse education at Bell College. Therapeutic Storytelling in Palliative Care

At the core of Psychosocial Care within Palliative Care, is providing the opportunity for patients to express themselves. Using creative processes to aid this to happen is well known within palliative care services. Recently, further development in this approach has occurred through the use of digital media. Digital stories are created by combining voice, personal photographs, other still images and music to produce a mini-movie. They are fairly simple to make using freely available software.

This one day workshop will demonstrate the potential of the digital storytelling approach, provide participant opportunity to explore and try out this approach in safe environment, consider its therapeutic value and identify applications in their own areas of work.

The workshop will begin by providing a brief overview of the use that has been made of digital storytelling in care contexts to date. We will then go on to explore the use of words, image and music in telling a story through a series of small workgroups. Each participant will then go on to create a personal storyboard.

This series of non-malignant study days aims to stimulate dialogue and the sharing of good practice in relation to promoting quality palliative care for this client group. The content will focus on the following:

- Examine the different illness trajectories illustrating changing palliative and end of life care needs for people with COPD, Heart Failure and Renal Failure
- Explore the use of prognostic indicators to aid assessment/review of care planning during deterioration in the final year of life and in the dying phase

As the first Macmillan community occupational therapist within a specialist palliative care team Debbie developed an interest in meeting the occupational needs of patients with a life limiting illness and valuing the meaning and purpose of occupation in a person's life; her session 'Don't die of boredom' will explore these issues.

Developing Communication and Counselling Skills with Patients who have Cancer

NEW FOR 2009/2010!

There is significant evidence that many people diagnosed with cancer do not feel supported with the emotional strain of living with cancer and its treatment (Macmillan Cancer Support, 2006). Furthermore, many healthcare professionals find communication with patients/families in distress extremely challenging. This four day course is specifically designed for Specialist Registrars in Oncology and Clinical Nurse Specialists/Senior nurses. It aims to explore the psychosocial needs of patients and the communication challenges involved in meeting these needs. Each course is developed from the group agenda. Topics may include,

- Recognising and responding to psychological distress
- Responding to information needs at diagnosis, during treatment episodes, as treatment ends and at the time of recurrence
- Managing emotional responses – anger, denial, guilt, uncertainty
- Supporting families – different expectations, collusion and conflict
- Promoting effective team working.

General Information

Strathcarron Hospice is a registered charity providing care and support for people from across the local area with cancer and other serious illnesses. Our dedicated team offers high-quality care for patients, and support for their families and helpers. Our catchment area covers the whole of Forth Valley, and the areas of Cumbernauld and Kilsyth in North Lanarkshire.

We care in a variety of ways according to the patient's individual needs.

Services at the hospice include an In-Patient Unit, Day Care, bereavement support and a Lymphoedema Clinic.

Support is also provided in patients' own homes where Strathcarron Nurse Specialists make over 5000 visits each year.
